CAUSE AND CONSEQUENCE

Why did historical events happen the way they did and what are the consequences?

Students will understand that:

- Events have a variety of and often unappreciated causes.
- Causes can be immediate or underlying.
- Consequences can be immediate or long-term.
- Broad underlying causes are often more important than immediate causes.
- People, alone or in groups, can cause events, but so can other forces such as ideas, beliefs, (religion, politics), institutions (governments) and other events.
- Consequences can be intended and unintended.
